RE-ISSUE

REPORT ON AN AUSTRIAN ACQUAINTANCE OF KRUZE.

From: STOCKHOLM

To: MOSCOW

17 October, 1944

To VIKTOR [1].

On 11th October 1944 "KLARA" reported from what had been told her by [~~4 groups unrecovered~~] KRUZE [2], who is friendly with her and works in the American Legation in STOCKHOLM.

[45 groups unrecoverable]

, as he, owing to his being pursued by the Gestapo, is being kept by the Americans in strict [1 group unrecovered]. KRUZE made his acquaintance by chance when she was working in the [25 Legation] late in the evening. He is an Austrian social-democrat, anti [~~1 word unrecovered~~]. He is not [0% allowed] out in the street, and when he goes into the town is taken by car by the Naval Attaché or someone else, [0% the car] being [9 groups unrecovered]. He is strictly [0% forbidden] to enter into contact with the [0% staff] of the Legation, which however he did not carry out and made the acquaintance of KRU.....[3]
