MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

SUBJECT: Department of Defense Documents Inconsistent with the
Provisions of NSCID No. 9 RevisedReference: Secretary of Defense Memorandum of 4 November 1952,
subject: Interim Implementation of NSCID No. 9
Revised

1. The inclosures are submitted in compliance with paragraph 1d of the reference.

2. Review and necessary revision of the items enumerated in the inclosures (and all other documents derived from or associated with these items) will be undertaken by the Director, National Security Agency, the Military Departments, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff to bring them into consonance with the provisions of NSCID No. 9 Revised.

3. Communication security (COMSEC) does not come within the sphere of authority of NSCID No. 9 Revised. However, many of the documents affected by NSCID No. 9 Revised involve communication security as well as communication intelligence (COMINT). It is, therefore, necessary that the portions of these documents affecting communication security remain in effect subject to further instructions from the Secretary of Defense.

4. The Secretary of Defense memorandum to the Joint Chiefs of Staff of 20 May 1949, "Organization of Cryptologic Activities within the National Military Establishment" conflicts directly with NSCID No. 9 Revised. It is recommended that the Secretary

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

sonance with NSCID No. 9 Revised.




