
SUBJECT: Missent Traffic from RUEPCR

1. Reference your Memorandum for the Record, dated 5 July, Subject: Telephone Conversation with Mr. Morton A. Brill, OCCE. As a result of General Carter's phone call to General Johnson; and delivery to Mr. Brill of the heading of missent messages the following has ensued:

2. Received a call from Colonel Emerson, OCCE, stating review was being conducted immediately and actions were being taken to correct the situation. He asked for a daily report on the progress or lack of progress to be made to Mr. Camp in the same office.

3. Such contact has been made by me with Mr. Camp on 5, 6, 7 July and at Mr. Camp's request with Mr. Sam French, Ass't Chief Opns Branch, DA CommCenter 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 July.

4. As a result of this close coordination, changes in in-station practice at DA and the addition of page monitors on their circuits to us, the mishandled messages have diminished from 30 to 50 a day to 4 to 9 for a 24-hour period out of an average daily total of 1,000 transmissions. The number of missents for the latest 24-hour period was 3 out of 984.
