1. It the request of the Deputy Director, the Director of security contacted Mr. Friedman and suggested that aince he anticipates being out of the city for an extended period of time, the Agency classilifed documents in his possession whould be maintained at IBA For sarekeeping until his return. Mr. Friedman indicated that he would be leaving the city ahortly after 1 January 1959 and agreed that definite plans should be made to pick up the classified documenta aometime duxing the week of 29 December. Mr. Fiedman woiced no objection regarding Mgency elassified documents in his possession. He did indicate that he has a considerable smount of material thich is historical and was once ciassitied. It has since been declassified and subsequently, on the basis of Depertment of Defense ruling, classifich again. Mr. Mriedman stated that this material wes widely disseminated wen it was declassified and much of it is in the pablic domain. He pointed out that thismaterial has been integrated into his ilbrary and it would be ditilicult for him to locate. He expressed extrene reluctance in having this material turned over to the Agency.
2. It appears that this problen lrreaks dow in two parts. The first is Agency classified material wich has been loaned to Mr. Friedman. This material should be casily identifiable and can be picked up and returned to the Agency by persomel from security without any difficulty. The other problem deals with material acquired by Mr. Friedman over many years. This material probably is not easily identifiable and some difficuity would be encountered in locating it, deternining its classification, and returning it to the Agency. This is particularly true in view of Dr. Triedruan's reluctance.
3. It is felt that Mr. Friedman if probably true in his observations that much of this material is videly dissemineted and in the hands of people without clearances. It in felt that no grave security problem would resuit by leaving this material in the bome of Mr. Friedman during his absence. Mr. Friedasn is on notice that this material is classified and therefore is enjoined from using it in the preparation of may articles or books which he may demire to write. It io recommanded that percomel of this office, accompanied by personnel from the office of A ministrative Services, Nisit Ir. friedman during the wela of ze December to recover
 casily identiriabie and hich he grees coula be held at lish coming his absence.
