And today we have confirmation that the Netherlands Purchasing Commission in the US has bought a first sample order of 100. If this goes on, our own business here will be ruined. Isnt this contrary to the agreement, I entered into with the US War Dept?

With regard to your strip device (not strip tease?) Stu wrote me, and I answered him that I would gladly investigate the possibilities, and hoped to get a sample. So I hope to be able to say some more later on.
