KOLLAS's GOSSIP ABOUT SMIRNOVA'S DEPARTURE
REPORTED TO CLAYTON BY E. HUDSON

CLAYTON [KLEJTON][ii] [C] has passed to "TECHNICIAN [TEKhNIK]"[iii] [4 groups unrecovered] [C] received from an undercover [NELEGAL'NYJ] member of the party, E. HUDSON [HUDSON], who is living in QUEANBEYAN [KVIMBIEN] (7 miles from CANBERRA) about the gossip which is being spread around in QUEANBEYAN in connection with the departure of [B: SMIRNOVA][iv]. In her [v] letter HUDSON says that on

all the gossip about the Soviet Legation is being spread by a Russian - KOLLAS who lives near to it. The latter[b] [C] is one of [TEKhNIK]'s acquaintances. He knew him through the KRANIDOVs [KRANIDOVY] and kept in touch with SMIRNOV[v]. At one time he worked as a gardener at the Legation, but was soon dismissed. After that he became angry and began to spread all kinds of dirt in regard to the Legation. According to what

HUDSON writes, KOLLAS one day came to ALEXANDER [ALEKSANDER][e] [10 groups unrecovered] SMIRNOVA naturally not [2 groups unrecovered] government. But her husband and daughter [2 groups unrecovered] Russia. [B/ SMIRNOVA] herself

[D. HUDSON] also points out that SMIRNOVA allegedly received some kind of letter from America through KOLLAS. She describes SMIRNOVA as a foolish woman. In conclusion H.[vi] is asking the Central Committee [TsK][vii] to render help and stop the slander being spread by KOLLAS.
